

"That was Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday," said the boy.





Engine bays and Club members Cobras on display at Burswood 2001














Whiteman Park Classic Car Show 2002



EDITORIAL.....

Well at the January meeting it was decided by majority that the Clubman award should go......it's a sad move I feel. I believe with a little effort the Committee could have come up with a more evenly balanced system that would give those in the Club an achievement award that would be justly deserved. Maybe we will resurrect this award in a couple of years time?

Again we do not seem to be supporting Club members who put the effort in in attending meetings, runs or other motoring/club events etc. Maybe we as a Club should "expand" our annual "show 'n shine" and other car show we attend. I believe that we are letting the hard efforts of the majority go unrewarded? The "wannabe racers" of the Club supposedly are not representing the Club when they do their thing because they have to join another Club to get a CAMS licence. They are still members of the Cobra Car Club and as a group represent the Club I say.

On another matter, have you checked your insurance renewal lately. Got mine in January from Shannon's, it had risen \$120 to \$584 for cover of \$25,000 with restrictions. When I approached the insurer and after discussions on this matter, I was later informed by the insurer that the amount shown on this invoice was what was expected in payment. In other words "matter closed pay up or go elsewhere". Elsewhere I did go. Firstly "Famous Car Company" a phone call, immediately \$50 cheaper over the phone quote. Then onto "Torque" situated in the "Terrace", Perth. Written quote from them of \$445 for a cover of \$27,000. The people there do seem to know of our cars in detail. Also read your Policy there have be changes to them, like "wreck retention" etc you will be surprised.

I attended a recent Combined Car Clubs meeting the other night and was very interested in the guest speaker (John Palandri). He spoke on his experiences with "Public Liability". Basically, being "Incorporated" as a Club does not give you any protection from having legal action taken against the Club or individuals. For our Club to endeavour to protect itself against litigious action we would probably need a policy to cover us for around \$8,000,000, at an annual cost of \$2,000. What car club can afford that fee? Probably none. However, the National Body of car clubs is looking into taking a policy that will cover all Clubs affiliated with State and National Body and Clubs will pay on a pro-rata basis of numbers of members. (more details in the coming weeks)


Now guys it was quite evident to me, that those of us that have "active side pipes" on our cars are in danger of having legal actions taken against the us (Individual and Club Executive) should someone be burnt from these hot exhaust systems. Heat shields are mandatory under the ADR's and just maybe our

Club should enforce this Rule as a "Duty of Care" to the Public.
