

Fremantle Prison 09/09/05

The plan was to meet at the Sail & Anchor at 6 pm for a meal, and some drinks, Dave and I were the first to arrive, followed by Colin and Naomi Hall, Sue Payne and Murray Neindoif, then Dave Bennie and gang, Harry turned up with his grandson, and then Brian and Sue Plank. So it was time to get stuck into a very nice meal and some nice cold drinks and a chat. Around 7.20 we started our small walk up to the Prison and I must say it was a very cold walk to. Just as we almost got to the prison we were joined by Rob Payne, he had other things to do before the prison tour. When we got to the prison we were all very cold. We had around 10 min's before the tour started when someone said that was a information center to our right and it was very warm in side, so a you could imagine we all made a dash inside. Ah yes it was very warm inside, but it was also filled with a lot of good information and memorabilia, we were glad we went in, as it was very interesting, but it was time to go out into the cold again as the tour was about to start. So we made our way out back into the cold and yes it was very bloody cold. Then we were introduced to our tour guide, after a brief talk we went on our way, to the first place that the prisoners were taken to, this is also where we got our little torches (that we were told we would need) then on with the tour we went. One of the first things we were told was that yes the prison is haunted, well that put the fears up most of us, then we went into the first section, the kitchen and dinning rooms. From their we went into the first cell block, and why we were all standing listening to our tour guide, she was explaining to us the reason why there was a safety net above our heads, they had to put that there as some of the prisoners would jump from the second or third floor and try and commit suicide, just then we heard a scream and a body fell onto the net and I can tell you I for one sh-t my self a long with a lot of others and Harry's grandson whom was right under the net well you should have seen his face, he had this terrified look on his face mind you so did I, I must admit. You should have seen all of the torches come on and point up and to our surprise it was a dummy, thank god. But I can tell you we were all on the look out for the next scare. From there we went to look at some of the cells, and I can tell you I was so glad that I was not a prisoner in prison,

they were so small and cold and the beds, well as you can see from the photos they were not the most comfortable beds we have seen. You should see the paintings, as a therapy and for good behavior some of the prisoners were allowed to do things in there cells, and some of them did paintings and as you can see below some of them were very good painters.









We also went in to the yard where they used to punish the prisoners by whipping them. The tour guide asked for two volunteers to demonstrate the whipping, and this young girl stood forward and then dragged her boyfriend forward, so the guide asked who wanted to be whipped and the young lady said me. So she was put in position and then the boyfriend started to whip her, and I think she was really enjoying it, and I must say so were some of the men watching as they did not stop talking about it. Get over it boys. We then went into the solitary confinement and I must say that I thought that the other

cells were small but these took the cake by far. While we were standing there you would not believe it, but the door to one of the cells burst open and out came a man, shouting "what the hell do you all think you are doing", "the one place a man thought he could get piece and quiet would be solitary confinement, and then all of you come in and make all of that noise". He went on to tell us all about solitary confinement, how you could be in there for weeks with no contact with anyone, but if you went in to what they called the number one cell right and the front, that was worse, as that is where you put if you were to be hung. You would be put in there for two hours and then the door would open and they would take you for a one minute walk and that is all it took before you were in the hanging chamber. Then that was it, it was all over red rover, we went into the hanging chamber and it was very eerie, I could not wait to get out of there. We then went on to the next block, that seemed to be much cleaner and not so cold, the cells were a

little better to, we were led up to the second floor to see the cell that they held Moondyne Joe in. Moondyne Joe was first arrested in 1848 in this time he escaped many times, as Moondyne Joe was well known for escaping from prison. They put him into a cell that was lined on the floors, ceiling, and walls, he was also chained around his legs, hands, and neck so that he could not escape, but during this confinement Joe's health began to suffer. On the order of the doctor, he was given daily exercise breaking stones in a prison yard near the perimeter wall; the broken rock was supposed to be removed at the end of each day, but his guards over-



looked this procedure. Slowly the pile of rock grew so that it obscured him as he worked. At 5 pm on 7 March when the guards checked, Joe had cut a hole through the west wall at the front of the Prison letting himself to the back yard of Superintendent Lefroy's house which backed up against the Prison wall. From there he passed through an unlocked side door to the front of the Prison ... (and)...a safe transit to the neighboring bush". He remained at large for almost two years despite extensive searching soon after his escape. On 25 February 1869 Joe broke into Houghton's vineyard in the Swan Valley. Unknown to Joe, police officers were at work nearby recovering the body of a man, the victim of a drowning. Joe hid in the vineyard cellars waiting for his chance to make off with stolen goods, once the coast was clear. Unluckily for him, a 1 am on the 26 February the owner of the vineyard brought the police officers back to the cellars for a social drink, a reward for their work in recovering the body of the drowned man. Dashing past the owner and trying to escape, Joe literally ran into the surprised long arms of the law as they were about to enter the cellar. Joe said I don't know who was more surprised them or me, shortly after his recapture he was charged with escaping from legal custody and sentenced to twelve months additional imprisonment in irons, six months to which were to be passed in strict separate confinement. Joe made his final escape on 13 August, but he died and was buried on 15 August in a pauper's grave that can still be seen at Fremantle Cemetery.

We also went in to the prison chapel of which is haunted, but a very nice chapel. That is were the tour finished our tour guide thanked us for coming and we thanked her for scaring us half to death. From there we went back down to the cappuccino strip for a nice hot cuppa and some nice cake. But where we stopped did not sell cake, so Rob Payne and I ran across the road to get some cake, when we got back our cupper was already waiting for us, so we go stuck right it to it. Some of the others had pizza that looked good to, well as the night went on it got colder and colder so we decided to call it a night so we all went on our way. Thought's go out to all those who did not go on the prison tour, you missed a really good night, and I recommend that you do it, it is really interesting. And I would like to thank all that came and made it a really good night.
